

eadership formation is a critical factor in the future of the Catholic health care ministry, especially as we consider that lay people, more often than not, are now running our organizations. For today's leaders to embrace and promote that same sense of mission and ministry that came naturally for the founders of Catholic health care, colleagues throughout the ministry need to continue discerning the evolution of leadership formation for their organizations.
