Statement on Policy of Separating Children from Parents at the Border

Children, regardless of their nationality, are among the most vulnerable members of our society. The Catholic Health Association is strongly urging the Trump Administration to reverse its "zero tolerance" policy toward undocumented immigrants that has resulted in children being separated from their parents and detained in separate facilities. This policy poses a grave risk to the health of the affected children and should not be allowed to continue.

CHA reaffirms the position of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, which stated, "Our government has the discretion in our laws to ensure that young children are not separated from their parents and exposed to irreparable harm and trauma. Families are the foundational element of our society and they must be able to stay together."

As Pope John Paul II said in *Familiaris Consortio*, "In the Christian view, our treatment of children becomes a measure of our fidelity to the Lord himself." The way we treat children is also a reflection on the moral fabric of our society. It is the hope of CHA that this immoral policy will be reversed and that these children can be reunited with their parents.
