

A Reflection on the Second Week of Advent

Advent is a time for anticipation, hope and preparing for the coming of Christ. We sing, "Come, O long expected Jesus, born to set your people free; from our fears and sins release us; free us from captivity." In this time of anticipation, we make space for Him in our lives and hearts. However, as much as we want to be ready to receive Him, human beings are not very good at cleaning out clutter.

A Voice of one crying out in the desert:

'Prepare the way of the Lord,

Make straight his paths."
